3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.	
4 This Act may be cited as the "Resilient Manufa	ıc-
5 turing Task Force Act of 2020".	
6 SEC. 2. RESILIENT MANUFACTURING TASK FORCE.	
7 (a) Definitions.—In this section—	

1	(1) the term "Secretary" means the Secretary
2	of Commerce;
3	(2) the term "supply chain bottleneck" means
4	a limitation in a production value chain that re-
5	stricts the overall speed or reliability of the manu-
6	facturing process;
7	(3) the term "Task Force" means the Resilient
8	Manufacturing Task Force established under sub-
9	section $(c)(1)$ ; and
10	(4) the term "veteran" has the meaning given
11	the term in section 101 of title 38, United States
12	Code.
13	(b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
14	gress that—
15	(1) the COVID-19 pandemic has—
16	(A) exposed significant vulnerabilities in
17	the manufacturing sector of the economy of the
18	United States; and
19	(B) led to equipment shortages, supply
20	chain bottlenecks, and workforce misalignments;
21	(2) the vulnerabilities described in paragraph
22	(1) go largely unnoticed until they are revealed by
23	disease outbreaks, cyber attacks, natural disasters,
24	and other emergencies;

1	(3) the crises described in paragraph (2)
2	produce valuable information, the collection and
3	analysis of which can inform policies to fortify the
4	economy of the United States against future threats;
5	and
6	(4) the responsibility for promoting national
7	economic resilience lies with the Federal Govern-
8	ment, which must not miss the opportunity pre-
9	sented by the COVID-19 pandemic to learn from
10	that crisis and prepare the United States to better
11	withstand future emergencies.
12	(c) RESILIENT MANUFACTURING TASK FORCE.—
13	(1) Establishment.—
14	(A) In general.—Not later than 90 days
15	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-
16	retary, in coordination with the Secretary of
17	Defense, the Secretary of Energy, and the
18	heads of any other Federal agencies that the
19	Secretary determines appropriate, shall estab-
20	lish the Resilient Manufacturing Task Force.
21	(B) Responsibilities of the sec-
22	RETARY.—In carrying out subparagraph (A),
23	the Secretary, in coordination with the officials
24	described in that subparagraph, shall—
25	(i) determine—

1	(I) the number of members who
2	shall comprise the Task Force; and
3	(II) the qualifications of the
4	members described in subclause (I);
5	(ii) appoint the members of the Task
6	Force; and
7	(iii) establish procedures regarding
8	the operation of the Task Force, including
9	by determining the frequency with which
10	the Task Force shall meet.
11	(2) Duties.—The duties of the Task Force
12	shall be the following:
13	(A) To identify critical vulnerabilities in
14	the supply chains of products and resources
15	that are essential to the economic security of
16	the United States, focusing in particular on
17	vulnerabilities that have been exacerbated by
18	the COVID-19 pandemic.
19	(B) To mitigate the vulnerabilities de-
20	scribed in subparagraph (A) by developing
21	plans for the following:
22	(i) The formation of a National Man-
23	ufacturing Guard, which shall be a reserve
24	of industry volunteers who are trained and
25	empowered to, in times of crisis, help man-

1	age manufacturing supply chains, logistics
2	infrastructure, and workforce resources.
3	(ii) The establishment of a Supply
4	Chain Data Exchange, which shall support
5	the National Manufacturing Guard de-
6	scribed in clause (i) by providing real-time,
7	centralized information on a national scale
8	regarding, with respect to manufacturing
9	supply chains, inventory, capacity, re-
10	sources, and supply chain bottlenecks.
11	(iii) The formation of a Technology
12	Corps to serve as a workforce pipeline that
13	prioritizes manufacturing skills that the
14	Task Force and the National Manufac-
15	turing Guard described in clause (i) deter-
16	mine to be essential to the economic secu-
17	rity of the United States.
18	(C) In carrying out subparagraph (B)(iii),
19	to pay particular attention to increasing edu-
20	cational and training opportunities for under-
21	represented minorities, women, and veterans.
22	(3) Advice.—In carrying out the duties of the
23	Task Force, the Task Force shall seek to obtain ex-
24	pertise from the public and private sectors, including
25	from—

1	(A) manufacturing extension centers cre-
2	ated and supported under the Hollings Manu-
3	facturing Extension Partnership established
4	under section 25 of the National Institute of
5	Standards and Technology Act (15 U.S.C.
6	278k);
7	(B) industry consortia and trade groups;
8	(C) private business entities, including
9	small manufacturers;
10	(D) Federal, State, and local government
11	specialists, including economic policymakers and
12	military logistics experts;
13	(E) academic and research institutions;
14	(F) labor organizations; and
15	(G) Manufacturing USA institutes de-
16	scribed in section 34(d) of the National Insti-
17	tute of Standards and Technology Act (15
18	U.S.C. 278s(d)).
19	(4) Termination.—The Task Force shall ter-
20	minate on the date that is 1 year after the date on
21	which the Secretary establishes the Task Force
22	under paragraph (1).
23	(5) Applicability.—The Federal Advisory
24	Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply with

1	respect to the Task Force or the activities of the
2	Task Force.
3	(d) Reporting Requirements.—The Secretary
4	shall—
5	(1) not later than 90 days after the date of en-
6	actment of this Act, submit to Congress a report re-
7	garding the formation of the Task Force, which
8	shall contain—
9	(A) an identification of the members of the
10	Task Force, the respective areas of expertise of
11	those members, and the expected roles of those
12	members; and
13	(B) a preliminary plan for carrying out the
14	duties of the Task Force, including forecasts
15	for costs, a preliminary timeline with respect to
16	the activities of the Task Force, and the ex-
17	pected resource needs of the Task Force; and
18	(2) not later than 90 days after the date on
19	which the Task Force terminates, submit to Con-
20	gress a report containing—
21	(A) a description of the activities of the
22	Task Force during the 1-year period in which
23	the Task Force was in effect;
24	(B) a comprehensive description of how the
25	Task Force carried out the duties of the Task

1	Force described in subsection $(c)(2)$ , which
2	shall include any related policy recommenda-
3	tions;
4	(C) a recommendation regarding whether
5	Congress should establish a Resilient Manufac-
6	turing Advisory Council to continue the role of
7	the Task Force on an extended or permanent
8	basis; and
9	(D) if applicable, a proposal outlining, with
10	respect to the Council described in subpara-
11	graph (C)—
12	(i) the scope and activities of the
13	Council; and
14	(ii) the funding and resource require-
15	ments of the Council.
16	(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
17	are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary
18	\$5,000,000 for fiscal year 2020 to carry out this section,
19	which shall remain available until expended.
